Classroom News - Kindergarten through Second Grade

Kindergarten: We were excited about our musical cantata we are presenting with the first and second graders. And we're ready for Lei Day with songs and our own hulas. Our graduation operetta is coming soon and we're learning our speaking parts, learning lots of songs and solos, and painting scenery. We'll have special Boys' Day and Mother's Day activities, too. We will read to Mrs. Olson and get acquainted with first grade. So many exciting things happening while we continue to write, do math, read, and spell. Oh, and we'll have one more Wheel Week. Exciting times.

First grade: The first graders are busy learning about non-fiction reading and writing! Each child is a member of a non-fiction book club and is researching a topic that interests them. They are learning to take notes as they read, and will use these notes to help them write a big "All About" non-fiction book. The book will include a table of contents, several chapters, diagrams, and a "How-To" chapter! They are looking forward to sharing their books in order to teach others what they have learned through their research. The children are also excited to dance and share their oli with everyone at our May Day celebration. We have several exciting excursions planned for the last month of the school year and hope that our families will join us!

Second grade: The second grade students had a wonderful time on our field trip to the Nature Center. We went fishing in a stream, hiking up a muddy trail, and went hunting for wiggly worms and other decomposers. It was a great review of all of the cycles in nature that we have been learning about in science. The students have been practicing their hula for May Day. For some of us it's the very first time dancing the hula! In math we have been learning how to make different graphs, diagrams, and charts. We are working to get ready for the SAT testing by learning how to use good listening skills, make good guesses, and doing practice test.

Classroom News - Third & Fourth Grade

Third grade: Third grade has been busy working on our May Day performances. Mahalo to Mrs. Oliveros and Mr. Keni for working with our class for our presentation. We have been doing lots of review for our SAT testing for next week. We took a field trip to the Kaneohe Library to gather information for our Wax Museum project. We have been spending time getting information from our books so that we can work on our timelines and the report. We have been working with fractions in math and learning about the 13 Original Colonies in social studies. We continue to work hard as our school year begins to wind down. Remember that students need 10 A.R. points this quarter, so make sure they are getting their reading done

Fourth grade: During the month of April, the fourth graders were exploring electricity and magnetism. They learned how electromagnets and electric motors work. The students can't wait to build their own electromagnets. They have been busy learning all about ancient Hawaiian war tactics. The students were surprised to learn that the Hawaiians celebrated a four month holiday that prevented them from engaging in any wars battles. The makahiki started at

the end of October. This was a time of peace for the Hawaiian people. The chiefs and koa (warriors) played games and trained for battles during this time. The fourth graders visited Hokule'a this month and learned all about how she was reengineered for her world voyage. The

Our Big Island trip is just around the corner! The students will be on the Big Island May 11-13. We will be flying in and out of Kona and circumnavigating the island in three days. We will be visiting

the heiau that King Kamehameha built, an ancient fishpond, waterfalls, Pu'uhonua O Honaunau (city of refuge), Volcano National Park, Petroglyph Park in Puako, the Naha stone that King Kamehameha lifted, and much more.

Classroom News - Junior High

Mrs. Hantel's News:

For the next several weeks students in **seventh grade Bible** will be writing sermons for the keiki of Saint Mark Lutheran Church. On Sunday they will share their special message with the keiki and help out during Sunday School.

Eighth grade American history students will use many primary sources to learn more about history in the 19th and 20th centuries. These documents include the book, *The Jungle*, drafts of President Roosevelt's war speech, and first-hand accounts of the civil rights movements.

Seventh grade geography students will be studying the geography, history and cultures of Asia.

Sixth through eighth grade math classes will be trying out math stations, some of which include yummy food!

On May 16, the **seventh and eighth grade** students will travel to Ford Island to participate in an overnight stay on the U.S.S. Missouri Battleship!

Miss Maddick's News:

Bravo! Our **Jr. High Speech Festival** went well. Thank you to the students for their hard work and to the parents for being so supportive!

In **language arts** we are reading themed books. The **sixth grade** theme is World History and Cultures. The **seventh grade** theme is people with special needs. The **eighth grade** theme is WWII in Europe and the Pacific.

Communications classes will be busy with **seventh grade** demonstration speeches and **eighth grade** poetry readings.

Sixth grade world history is exploring the major explorers of the 15th-18th centuries. We will see how they viewed people in those places and the conflicts that resulted. It is interesting that conflicts today have roots in what we see in our history books.

We continue to learn about how to live our Christian faith, we continue our study of Gary Chapman's 5 Love Languages. We have examined Words of Affirmation, Gifts, and are starting Acts of Service. We will then delve into Quality Time and Physical Touch (like hugs!). All of these Love Languages help us share God's love with our families, friends, and beyond.

Mrs. McGregor's News:

Sixth grade Bible students studied Proverbs, a collection of wise sayings written by Solomon, to better understand what God says about wisdom. They are now discussing the prophesies in the Old Testament and the fulfillment of prophecy in the New Testament.

Seventh grade science students are studying the human body, the skeletal system and the muscular

system. They learned about the Integumentary System, and can identify the different layers of skin. They will spend time learning about caring for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd degree burns and how to avoid skin cancer. The students loved performing a virtual knee surgery and brain surgery at www.edheads.org/activities/knee. Really cool!

Sixth grade science students are studying weather and participating in interactive games to learn about the electromagnetic spectrum. While studying heat transfer, they completed experiments on convection currents, watched videos, and made use of engaging websites. They also made an anemometer to measure wind speed at various locations on campus. They will wrap up the unit by studying cloud types and hearing stories from storm trackers.

Eighth grade science students have been studying forces and Newton's Laws of Motion. They have completed experiments on friction using a spring scale to measure in (N) and shared ideas on how to design an experiment that demonstrates Newton's Third Law.


Our Athletic Banquet is rapidly approaching. Plans are underway to honor our athletes. More information will be sent home later.
