Classroom News - Third & Fourth Grade

Third Grade:

The third grade has started the second quarter with a bang. We are working on our quilt for the Gala. thanks to Mrs. Lee and some great help from parents. It is turning out very nicely. We have started a science unit on the earth, sun and moon. We have been working outside at different times of the day measuring our shadows to see how the position of the sun and time of day affect the length of our shadows. In math we are subtracting three digit numbers and trying to remember, "Bottom Bigger, Better Borrow". We will also be working a lot with maps this quarter. Since the second quarter is shorter than other quarters, please encourage your child to get their AR points early. 15 out of our 17 students will be having lunch provided by the

teacher for reaching their six point AR goal for the first quarter. They have become real readers.

Fourth Grade:

It was so wonderful seeing the fourth graders' beautiful smiles as they walked through my door on the first day back from Fall Break. I sure did miss them. The fourth graders were surprised to see their teacher in a cast from the knee down. They have been such great helpers in the classroom. Mahalo nui loa keiki! Before the students ended their first quarter of the school year, they explored the religion of the ancient Hawaiian people. The students were amazed to learn that the Hawaiian people worshiped many gods and that all the gods had their own purpose. The boys were very fascinated with the

war god Kū. I'm not surprised. My students were extremely excited to learn that we will be visiting a pu'uhonua (place of peace or refuge) on our Big Island trip. We will visit the largest and most famous pu'uhonua in Honaunau. It feels very rewarding to connect what they are learning from a textbook to a real life experience. The fourth graders created their own rain in a fun science lab involving a small scale simulated mud slide. We are currently exploring weathering and erosion. The students predicted how the rain might shape our land. Fourth graders know how to make science fun!

Classroom News - Junior High

Mrs. Hantel's News:

The **seventh graders** are spending the next quarter studying the life, miracles and parables of Jesus. The students are also diving into the Bible using the SOAP method. This method allows the student to break the verses into smaller parts so they can come to a higher understanding of the Word and how to apply the verse to their lives.

The seventh grade social studies class made a trip across the mainland and across the pond over to Europe. After studying the different physical features and locations of European countries, the students will look into the history and culture of the different countries. The eighth graders finished their study of the Constitution last quarter. During the next few weeks they will look into how the Constitution took shape, starting with our first president, George Washington.

The **sixth graders** are growing more confident in their math skills. They love being able to practice these skills on their individual whiteboards. **Seventh grade prealgebra** students are spending the next few weeks practicing some of their foundational math skills so they can be fully prepared when they begin solving multistep equations. The **eighth graders** are stepping up the difficulty level and are solving for variables in increasingly challenging equations.

Miss Maddick's News:

This quarter is busy in all subject areas. Each language arts class is

reading a new book. Sixth grade is reading A Christmas Carol, seventh grade is reading Nothing But the *Truth*, and **eighth grade** is reading Uglies. All three novels prompt great discussion. Ask your child to tell you about them! In language arts and social studies we will be starting our research paper. This will keep them busy with check points all quarter and into next quarter. In sixth grade social studies we will be studying ancient Greece and Rome. In Bible, the eighth graders will be studying prayer, so help them remember to spend time in prayer. They will also practice studying the Bible in small groups with Pastor Matt, Mrs. Moerbe, and me.

Mrs. McGregor's News:

Students in **sixth grade science** class have been studying the earth's layers. Each student made Styrofoam models to represent the thickness and characteristics of the different layers. They used handmade plants, Goldfish crackers and a map of the "one landmass" to illustrate evidences of Pangaea. Currently, they are studying faults, plate tectonics, and earthquakes.

Seventh grade science students have been studying osmosis and diffusion. They completed several labs to enhance their understanding of these processes. Currently students have illustrated and given explanations of osmosis for celery in water vs. celery in a salt solution. Students were given the challenge to design their own experiment in order to test their scientific ques-

tion, make observations, and summarize data collected. The interesting results will be submitted the last week of October!

Join the **eighth graders** as they use clues to solve element brainteasers (Masked bandit: Nitrogen + Cobalt + Radium + Oxygen) in their science class. Students have been organizing elements in the Periodic Table, figuring number of protons, electrons and neutrons, defining parts of an atom, determining trends in atomic size and ionization energy in the Periodic Table and becoming familiar with the characteristics and purposes for a variety of elements. Students will be completing activities and proiects to enrich their understanding of the interesting elements in the Periodic Table of Elements.

Welcome back from Fall Break! We are picking up with football and will soon be moving on to soccer! We do a lot of running in football and soccer, so a friendly reminder to encourage your student to wear athletic shoes that give good support to protect their ankles from injury!
