Sixth graders studied Earth's moon, reviewed the moon's phases and discussed adventurous missions to space. Students completed a moon crater lab and worked on collaborative projects. Currently, the sixth graders are studying the solar system and have integrated math lessons with science to understand the dimensions of the inner and outer planets. This month, watch the night skies, you may see some of the planets lined up.

In science, seventh graders have studied living organisms, their habitats, and factors affecting population growth. Students had the opportunity to formulate ideas about issues regarding the white-tailed deer and its rapid population growth in parts of the United States and then defend their viewpoint. A mini research project on Earth's biomes will conclude their studies in Life Science. Keep inquiring!

Eighth graders have studied the electromagnetic spectrum and the different wavelengths emitted, and the many medical advances that have been made in the uses of elec-

tromagnetic waves. Students are wrapping up their school year studying behavior of light, concave and convex mirrors, the human eye, and advances in laser surgery. Keep discovering!
